Youth Recognition

CAYA's Youth Recognition Program, aligned with community efforts and interests in developing a culture of well-being, recognizes and honors Clarkston area youth in Kindergarten through Grade 12, for contributing to the well-being of the community through working on his/her own well-being (personal growth) and/or showing his/her concern for the well-being of others. In 2019, the number of honorees doubled from 100 to 200 for the traditional April Youth Recognition Ceremony and Dessert reception.

It was time to address the increasing number of honorees. Starting in 2020, the traditional Youth Recognition Ceremony and Dessert Reception would honor up to 115 youth, keeping the school-night ceremony to one hour. A second approach specially designed for individual schools provides an opportunity for more staff to recognize and honor youth for accomplishments of well-being than could be accommodated at the traditional ceremony. Clarkston Area Youth Assistance school-level Youth Recognition Award(s) was unveiled in early Spring 2020.





Both approaches are accomplished without ranking and ordering, giving each honoree equal importance. Affirmations for each honoree, the centerpiece for both approaches, are based on what nominators share using a well-being lens. Both approaches create wonderful memories for honorees and their families to draw upon for years to come.



COVID-19 did result in the cancellation/interruption of both approaches. Although the nomination process was interrupted and the 2020 Ceremony was canceled, 62 honorees still received personalized certificates from area dignitaries and an affirmation document suitable for framing which were mailed to honorees in Fall 2020. The Youth Recognition local school awards will begin at a time deemed appropriate by school administrators.

Fundraising

2020 had its share of challenges for our fundraising expectations. We were unable to hold our Bowl-A-Thon this year due to COVID-19, but we did launch our First Annual Pet Costume Contest in October, which proved to be a great source of joy and provided some much needed funds. While it did not bring in the same amount of financial support as our Bowl-A-Thon, it certainly lifted the spirits of our volunteers and staff as well as that of the contestants' owners and those viewing our website.

For the holidays, CAYA sold products from Motown Soup which is a non-profit, 100% volunteer organization that donates all profits to soup kitchens, homeless shelters, food banks and free medical clinics throughout the state of Michigan. They produce soups, dips, breads and desserts packaged in the form of mixes. Most of their products do not have added chemicals/preservatives. That fundraiser also brought in funds to support CAYA's services to the community as well as supporting Motown Soup and their projects. It was a win-win situation.

As 2021 rolls in, we will plan our fundraising projects as best as we can for the year. Currently, we anticipate having our Bowl-A-Thon, our Second Annual Pet Costume Contest and our Motown Soup fundraisers.

Family Education

The Family Education Committee identifies and plans education programs to promote family growth and youth development. Topics are chosen based on community trends. In the 2019-2020 year, the Family Education Committee planned several programs, many made possible through partnerships with Clarkston Coalition for Youth, Easterseals, and a grant from the Clarkston Area Optimist Club.

The Prime for Life class was a great success again this year. This educational class educates students on the risks of substance use and was put in place to help prevent and reduce substance use among youth, especially with vaping, alcohol, and marijuana use. This program was in collaboration with Clarkston Community Schools, Easterseals, and the Clarkston Coalition for Youth and yielded positive results in reducing substance use among the participants.

The Girls Stand Strong program was a great success as well and was especially popular among middle school girls. This program ran four weeks, focusing on participants learning various skills in communication, friendships, assertiveness, and more. We had also planned to partner with Calvary Lutheran Church and Clarkston Coalition for Youth to host the play, "Every Brilliant Thing." Unfortunately, the event was canceled due to COVID-19. We hope to bring it to the community sometime soon.

The Homework Club

The Homework Club (HWC), planned and implemented in 2004, offers the opportunity for school-aged kids to come to an academically and emotionally supportive environment twice a week after school. The program has operated successfully since that time due to the efforts of our sponsors and community volunteers who provide mentorship and tutoring as well as a nutritious meal. Bridgewater Park Apartments has been instrumental in the continuation of the HWC program by donating an apartment that the HWC has used since its inception.

The 2019/2020 school year brought 3rd through 5th grade students to the Homework Club eager to get started in the program. 14 tutors and two meal planners/preparers were ready for the charge at hand.

HWC students worked on homework and supplemental educational materials with their tutors. When homework completion was not an issue, often the students would gather in a group where a book would be read to them followed by comprehension questions. Topics including geography, science, culture, and math were introduced into daily sessions, and questions regarding those topics would be asked to students before they left for the day.

As expected in school, HWC students were encouraged to be kind and thoughtful to one another as well as to themselves. Completing and understanding homework promoted self-confidence and a more positive feeling about going to school.

The program operated smoothly until COVID hit and schools were forced to shut down. The HWC operates only when school is in session. Realizing the financial hardship the pandemic was creating for the HWC families, we provided food to these families that we dropped off each week until the school district started a weekly distribution. The hope is that once schools are back in session, the program can start up and operate as usual.

Camp & Skill Building Scholarships

Clarkston Area Youth Assistance offers Camp and Skill Building Scholarships to income-qualifying families to help Clarkston area students attend an activity and give them exposure to new skills and/or areas of interest.

This past year, CAYA awarded 29 Skill Building Scholarships for youth, which included various activities such as driver's training, tutoring, sports activities, dance, cheer and counseling. We also sent one student to overnight camp at Camp Ohiyesa. Due to unfortunate circumstances of the COVID-19 pandemic, Independence Township Parks and Recreation was unable to provide Summer Day Camp slots, so we were unable to scholarship students this year for day camp.

We would like to thank our community for supporting the efforts that afforded the opportunity for these students to enjoy these experiences!

Pinwheels for Prevention

APRIL IS BLUE PINWHEELS MONTH IN THE CLARKSTON COMMUNITY!

April is the month you expect to see bright blue pinwheels spinning throughout the community in Pinwheels for Prevention Gardens, demonstrating support for preventing and reducing child abuse—the maltreatment of children and youth in all of its forms. COVID-19 interrupted April 2020's pinwheels from blooming, but hopefully, April 2021 pinwheel gardens will come back even stronger!

POSITIVE CHANGE! The CAYA Pinwheels for Prevention Program has two overlapping focuses promoting positive change. First is the nationwide campaign, "April is Child Abuse Prevention Month," which the Pinwheels for



Prevention Program sponsors and supports for the Clarkston community. Since 2016, 2900 blue pinwheels have been planted in 135 Gardens of Prevention, increasing awareness and attention. The second focus aligns with the community interest of creating a culture of well-being—where all children and youth can thrive! Bookmarks were created to remind all of us to be kind and welcoming to others.

REFRAMING THE CONVERSATION ON CHILD ABUSE THROUGH KNOWLEDGE! The growth and development in research on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), trauma-informed approaches, well-being, and resiliency is reframing the conversation. Sharing this knowledge with the community is an important aspect to reduce and prevent child abuse because it reminds us how everyone has a role to play.

GRATEFUL! Each year there are many to thank for supporting and working with CAYA's Pinwheels for Prevention Program, representing a cross-section of the Clarkston community and the Clarkston Area Youth Assistance permanent sponsors. While April is Child Abuse Prevention month, every month, every week, every day, and every moment is an opportunity to positively impact someone's life, especially in these uncertain times.

THINGS WE CAN DO NOW TO CREATE A CULTURE OF WELL-BEING!

- Blue pinwheels represent the happiness and hopefulness of childhood: reminding us to help children and youth feel safe, hopeful, and welcomed throughout the community.

Mentors Plus

The Mentors PLUS Program matches pre-screened volunteers with local children who need a positive adult figure in their lives. Mentors and mentees meet weekly to engage in fun, meaningful activities together. Due to COVID, mentors and mentees have been meeting virtually. During the 2019-2020 school year, Clarkston had two mentor matches.
